TWENTY-NINTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME OCTOBER 18, 2015

The readings for the Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time address the mystery and meaning of Jesus' suffering and death. The early Christians relied heavily on Israel's prophetic tradition and the oral tradition connected to Jesus (and later recorded in the written Gospels) in making sense of the cross.

The closing words from Jesus in today's Gospel reading are key to putting the cross in perspective: "For the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many." Jesus offers these remarks in response to James and John, who are reacting to Jesus' third Passion prediction (see Mk 10:32-34).

Peter, James, and John are often associated in the synoptic Gospel tradition as the three (of the Twelve) closest apostles to Jesus. The request by James and John to share in Jesus' "glory" is part of the larger three-stage character development of the disciples in the Gospel of Mark. In Mark 1–7 (stage one), the disciples are characterized as not fully comprehending Jesus, but unconditionally following him (see, for example, Mk 4:35-41). In Mark 8–10 (stage two), the disciples begin to more fully understand who Jesus is (especially how Jesus' suffering is connected to his Messianic identity), but they begin to apply conditions to following Jesus. Today's Gospel reading is a prime example. James and John present a condition to Jesus: "Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask... Grant that in your glory we may sit one at your right and the other at your left." Mark 11–16 is stage three. Here the disciples now fully comprehend who Jesus is, and they abandon him.

Jesus uses the request by James and John to foreshadow to them and the other apostles their upcoming martyrdom: "The cup that I drink, you will drink." But he also uses their request to teach the apostles about the importance of servant leadership: "Whoever wishes to be great among you will be your servant; whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all." This sets the context for helping the apostles understand how Jesus' death on the cross is the ultimate act of service to others.

As the early Christians sought to comprehend more fully the meaning of the cross, they relied heavily on the Jewish prophets. The four suffering servant songs found in Isaiah 40–55 [words spoken by the unknown prophet during Israel's exile in Babylon (597–538 BC) referred to as "Second Isaiah"] provided fertile ground. In today's first reading, we hear an excerpt from the fourth and longest suffering servant oracle, Isaiah 52:13–53:12. This fourth oracle is the exiled, Israelite community reflecting on the death of its prophet. Professed nearly six hundred years before the death of Jesus on the cross, here we find the Israelites offering a prophecy that was fulfilled in Christ: "Through his suffering, my servant shall justify many, and their guilt he shall bear."

The author of Hebrews, writing perhaps as early as the late 60s AD, offers some profound insights into the suffering of Christ. Jesus, the "great high priest," suffered and died on the cross so that he was able "to sympathize with our weaknesses." Traditional Jewish high priests sympathized with the people on the level of sin. But Jesus, who was "without sin," needed to sympathize another way: he chose to suffer with us.



First, I remember, as a child, going out for a Sunday drive with my maternal grandparents. We drove around where all the family houses used to be and the family cottage at Detroit Beach. I always kept interested in my family and its history, enjoying going through the old family photos that my grandmother had kept. I also listened to my grandparents talk about what used to be where and what they knew to be around when they were growing up.

One of the projects that I worked on at the Archdiocesan Archives was the publication of the book, "Make Straight the Path, - a 300 year pilgrimage." I was tasked with obtaining photographs and going out to take photos of various sites in the Archdiocese of Detroit. I also coordinated book sales with the publishing firm in France. It was a wonderful experience in learning local history and the layout of the city of Detroit along the various corridors that exist today. We do have two copies of this book in our parish library for you to browse through.

We are working on enriching our outreach to the homebound. This is an important ministry to those who cannot attend Mass for one reason or another. There is a need for "Ministers of Care" to take communion to the homebound, either in their home or a care facility. Most likely it would be done on a Sunday, after Mass. NEWS FROM ST. ALEXANDER'S FOOD PANTRY

During the month of September, St. Alexander's Food Pantry served 182 families including 2 new families who were referred by St. Gerald's Parish.

Our Outreach Program could not operate without the help of many, many volunteers and they currently hail from the former St. Alexander's Parish, St. Gerald, St. Fabian, Our Lady of Sorrows, St. Kenneth, Nardin Park United Methodist and Joy Baptist Church in Westland. What many of you are probably not aware of is that our own St. Gerald's Knights of Columbus are always on call to assist with the heavy work when large orders arrive from the Gleaners Warehouse.

The Gleaners Warehouse in Detroit is a valuable resource to us, however it is not free. When we do have sufficient funds to pay for an order, we are required to place an order of at least 2,500 lbs. to qualify for free delivery. During the early days of September, a large Gleaners order along with our quarterly TEFAP (free food from the Department of Education) was delivered on site.

In addition to our many individual donors from St. Gerald, Our Lady of Sorrows, St. Fabian, Nardin Park United Methodist Church, North Congregational Church, First Presbyterian Church, Faith Covenant Church, Farmington Village Co-op, the Senior Division at the Costick Center, Heartfelt Harvest, a non-profit, Forgotten Harvest, Panera Bread and Starbucks of Downtown Farmington. Monetary donations as well as donations of groceries are greatly appreciated, and please know that we would not be able to continue our mission of serving the needy if not for our supporters.

Looking ahead reminds us of the hectic days leading up to the holidays. Our goal, once again this year, is to provide boxes of holiday food at Thanksgiving for 150 families and again at Christmas along with toys for the children for 150 families.

Our Food Pantry is open every Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday from 9:30 - 11:00 AM. We can also be reached by phone on those days during those hours at (248) 474-8231.
