

FIRST SUNDAY

February 14, 2016

OF LENT

The Gospel reading for the First Sunday of Lent is always the story of Jesus' temptation in the desert. Today we hear Luke's account of the temptation of Christ because we are in Year C. It is fitting at the start of the Lenten journey to reflect upon temptation—those areas in our lives that push us away from God and diminish our relationships with each other.

One of the basic tenets of our Christian faith is that Jesus was like us in all things but sin. This Christological doctrine finds its scriptural grounding in Hebrews 4:15 ("For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who has been similarly tested in every way yet without sin"). Immediately following his baptism in the Jordan, the synoptic Gospel tradition speaks of Jesus' temptations by the devil at the end of his forty days in the desert. When Jesus was most vulnerable—in a state of significant hunger after forty days of eating "nothing"—the devil first tempted him with food: "command this stone to become bread." Resisting this temptation, Jesus is then offered "power and glory ... if you worship me." Withstanding the allure to serve someone other than God, Jesus is next offered the chance to prove God's providence to save and protect his Son ("He will command his angels concerning you, to guard you"). With each temptation, Jesus was able to defeat the devil and his temptations by relying on Scripture (Dt 8:3; 6:13, 16). The devil enticed Jesus with all things human: the need for food and sustenance, the attraction to power and praise, and the inclination to question and test God. For this reason, we Christians practice the spiritual exercises of fasting, almsgiving, and prayer during the season of Lent. The exercise of these virtues keeps us close to God and keeps us focused on service to others.

Luke closes his temptation narrative with an intriguing commentary: "When the devil had finished every temptation, he departed from him for a time." Within Luke's Gospel, this is likely a foreshadowing to Luke 22:3-4. In Jesus' final days in Jerusalem, Luke tells us: "Then Satan entered into Judas, the one surnamed Iscariot, who was counted among the Twelve, and he went to the chief priests and temple guards to discuss a plan for handing him [Jesus] over to them." The devil could not succeed with tempting Jesus, but according to Luke, he did return and attempt to defeat Jesus through one of his own.

The first reading is from the Book of Deuteronomy. It is part of a longer speech in which Moses instructs the Israelites on how to celebrate a harvest festival in thanksgiving to God for their entry into the Promised Land. Today's reading offers a succinct summary of the Old Testament storyline from Abraham to Moses, about eight hundred years of biblical history. Moses taught the Israelites to be ever grateful to God for the first fruits of the harvest from the land upon which they were about to occupy. The harvest thanksgiving was an important reminder to Israel for their dependency on God. The lesson became part of Israel's cultic and ethnic identity. And Jesus relied heavily on the teachings from Deuteronomy to resist the devil's temptation. As the journey of Lent begins, the readings for today remind us to rely on both Scripture and tradition to find meaning in the journey. *Dr. Daniel J. Scholz*

Tim's Tidbits

We begin the season of Lent, as you entered the church today you probably noticed the stark environment. Lent calls us to enter the desert of repentance. The Cross is the central symbol of Lent and is our focus. In the Gathering Space we find the Cross, with a pedestal of rock and purple sash on this First Sunday of Lent. As we pass by it, we are reminded of what it symbolizes for us. When you pass by it, feel free to touch it, as you enter or exit the church proper. Let it serve as a reminder to you of the season. This is the Cross which we will use throughout the season and one that we will venerate on Good Friday. Throughout the season of Lent, let our Cross be our guide as we move towards the most sacred time of the Church Year—the Paschal Triduum.

A few years ago, I became acquainted with the Crosier Fathers and Brothers. I served on the staff at a parish ministered by a Crosier Father, a priest friend. I learned about the religious community and their charism. The following is an explanation of their charism taken from their website:

Spirituality of the Cross

An essential element of our charism is expressed in our name, the Order of the Holy Cross. Our spirituality of the cross is rooted in the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus (the Paschal Mystery). We recognize that there is much suffering and pain in the world, but we also believe the resurrection of Jesus guarantees that in our suffering and pain there is hope and healing. Because of this, we emphasize the glorious, or triumphant cross.

With Lent, always let our focus be on the glorious, redemptive act, of the triumphant cross. Our focus is always to be on the Resurrection, what we all await and hope for.

Two items to note on our parish calendar are the Soup Suppers. The first one is on Thursday, February 25 from 5:30 to 6:45. It is followed by Mass with Fr. Stephen Rooney presiding. Fr. Rooney will offer an extended Homily about the spirituality of St. Therese of Liseaux. He earned a Licentiate in Rome in Spirituality. His dissertation topic was what he will talk about. Fr. Stephen has served at a number of parishes in the Archdiocese. His recent Pastorates include St. Michael in Monroe, Our Lady of Mt. Carmel in Temperance and his current assignment of Our Lady on the River in Marine City. Father incardinated into the Archdiocese from the Cistercian Community in Ireland, his native home. He was ordained in 1985 and can speak four languages. He has been in the US since 1986 and became a citizen a few years ago.

The second will be on Thursday, March 10th, from 5:30 to 6:45. It is followed by Mass with Fr. Richard Leliaert, presiding. Fr. Richard will offer an extended Homily on "Covenant". He has a PhD from Berkley, CA in American Religious History and has served on the faculty of Nazareth College in Kalamazoo, Director of Spiritual Support Services at Oakwood Hospital in Dearborn and more recently, as Pastor of St. Robert Bellarmine Parish in Redford. Father incardinated into the Archdiocese of Detroit from the Crosier Community. He was ordained in 1967. He speaks Spanish fluently.

We invite parishioners and friends to attend these Lenten events. For the soup suppers, I invite you to consider bringing in a crock pot of your favorite recipe of soup to share with our community. It should be enough to serve folks. Please call me to let me know what soup you will bring. You can reach me either by phone at 248-477-7470 ext. 202 or email timwestfall.sgp@gmail.com. We look forward to you sharing your favorite soup with us. I have seen this done in other parishes and thought it would be a good idea to bring to the St. Gerald Parish Family. If you bake bread, feel free to bring a loaf to share. Fresh bread and freshly made soup to feed your body and the Eucharistic Liturgy to feed your soul. Come for the soup and stay for the Mass. You will be refreshed in mind/ spirit and body. Have a prayerful week.
