The readings for the Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time confront the issue of the exploitation of the poor. Throughout Israel's history, prophetic voices cried out against the social injustices that left many marginalized and vulnerable to those in power unwilling to defend the less fortunate.

The first reading comes from the Book of Amos. Active in the northern kingdom of Israel during the later years of the reign of Jeroboam II (786–746 BC), Amos often criticized the religious and political leaders of his day when he saw injustice and indifference to the law and the prophets. As heard in the first reading, Amos was especially critical of those in positions of power who exploited the poor for their own personal gain. Part of his prophetic message to the ruling elites was that God's divine wrath awaited those engaged in such unscrupulous behavior. Today's reading is part of Amos' larger vision of the summer fruit, the fourth of five visions experienced by Amos that foreshadowed the fall of the northern kingdom of Israel. Although Amos died before Assyria captured Israel in 721 BC, many Israelites were probably still alive when the northern kingdom fell to Assyria. These Israelites likely bore witness to the fulfillment of Amos' prophecies.

The Gospel reading is the parable of the dishonest steward. This is another parable found only in the Gospel of Luke. Like many of Jesus' parables, the ending is unexpected. The "rich man" (i.e., God) actually ends up praising the dishonest steward for acting "prudently" with the limited resources and limited time he had available as a result of his deceitful dealings with the rich man's property and debtors. In his unpacking of the parable with his disciples, Jesus makes the point that service to God and service to the pursuit of riches are incompatible with those who wish to be called disciples of the Lord. True and lasting wealth is achieved in the service of God and neighbor.

The second reading is once again taken from Paul's First Letter to Timothy. Considered one of the deutero-Pauline letters written by followers of Paul after his death and around the year AD 100, much of the content of 1 Timothy addresses proper church order. First Timothy outlines, for example, the qualifications and responsibilities of bishops, deacons, and elders, especially regarding refuting false teachers and promoting Paul's theology and ethics in current circumstances. In today's reading, we hear the author of 1 Timothy request that prayers and petitions be offered for all, including "kings and for all in authority." Part of this request may be stemming from the author's desire to signal to the ruling classes that Christianity offers no threat to the peace of Rome. Having suffered through regional and localized harassment and persecution, it was the desire of many Christian leaders for its members to simply live "a quiet and tranquil life in all devotion and dignity." The author hopes to persuade his community to accept and promote a peaceful assimilation within the larger social structures of the Roman Empire by affirming this course of action as "good and pleasing to God our savior."

The author of 1 Timothy includes in his argument what some scholars consider to be a very early Christological hymn: "For there is one God. There is also one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as ransom for all." This "textual fossil" offers us a glimpse into the church's primitive theological assertions.
